Position Purpose

Western Health's Mental Health and Wellbeing Service (WH MH&WS) is situated in a growth corridor where continuous development, service expansion and innovative new programs are on the rise. Working within our catchment area allows for challenging and rewarding careers, where teamwork, flexibility and achievement are apparent in everything we do. We recognise that it takes a team to run a successful service and we value and support all our team members

The Intensive Support Program provides focused, higher-intensity community mental health support for consumers who require more frequent contact, structured interventions, and coordinated care planning. As an ISP Clinician, you will hold the key clinician role for an allocated caseload and provide recovery-oriented, evidence-based interventions tailored to consumer needs.

The role requires strong clinical skills, sound judgement, and the ability to work collaboratively within a small multidisciplinary team. Work includes assessment, care planning, intervention, and coordination across internal and external services. You will also contribute discipline-specific input to support consumers allocated within the ISP function.

This role balances direct clinical work with timely documentation and adherence to service expectations, including relevant KPIs and legislative requirements under the Mental Health and Wellbeing Act 2022.

Business Unit Overview

The Division of Mental Health and Wellbeing Services spans across multiple Western Health sites and within the local community and services consumers across the lifespan.

The Division has recently been established following a key recommendation from the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System.

Western Health's Mental Health and Wellbeing Service (MH&WS) provides a comprehensive range of specialist mental health services to people residing in the local government areas of Melton, Brimbank, Maribyrnong and parts of Hume (Sunbury/Bulla). We deliver specialist clinical programs across Adult Community Services, EMH/PARC/CL Psychiatry, the St Albans Community Care Unit, the Adult Mental Health Rehabilitation Unit, and the Adult Acute Inpatient Unit.

The MH&W service is situated in a growth corridor characterised by continuous development, service expansion, and innovative new programs.

Our recovery-oriented care is delivered by a skilled multidisciplinary workforce, including lived and living experience workers, with input from consumers and carers. These services include hospital based, community and specialist mental health and wellbeing services for adults, older adults, children and adolescents who are experiencing, or are at risk of developing a serious mental illness.

The Division collaborates across a number of Divisions within Western Health and partners with external health services and community services to ensure the provision of Best Care.

The Division aims to innovate and develop services and care options across Western Health to ensure Best Care for the community of Western Melbourne.

Key Responsibilities

Clinical Care

- Provide recovery-focused clinical care within scope of practice for consumers allocated to the ISP.
- Complete comprehensive assessments, formulate care plans, and deliver evidence-based interventions.
- Monitor consumer progress and clinical risk, responding promptly to changes in presentation.
- Develop transition and discharge plans in collaboration with the multidisciplinary team.

Care Coordination

- Act as the key clinician for an allocated caseload, coordinating care in partnership with consumers, carers and relevant supports.
 - Communicate clearly and consistently with internal teams and external providers to support continuity of care.
 - Advocate for consumer needs and support engagement with community and specialist services.

Legislative and Policy Compliance

- Work in accordance with the Mental Health and Wellbeing Act 2022 and associated policies, procedures and guidelines.
- Ensure all care aligns with organisational, legislative and professional standards.

Team Contribution

- Participate actively in team meetings, clinical discussions and case reviews.
- Contribute discipline-specific perspectives to support consumers within the ISP function.
- Undertake team-based tasks and portfolio activities appropriate to the classification.

Documentation and Systems

- Maintain timely, accurate and comprehensive clinical documentation in line with Western Health standards.
- Use electronic systems to record activity, support clinical decision-making and meet reporting requirements.

Professional Development

- Participate in supervision, reflective practice, learning opportunities and mandatory training.
- Engage in performance development discussions and incorporate feedback into practice.

KPI Expectations

 Work within relevant service KPIs, including contact expectations, documentation standards and timely entry of clinical activity.

About You

- You are an experienced mental health clinician who brings strong clinical skills, sound judgement and a recovery-oriented approach to your work.
- You enjoy being part of a supportive team and can manage your caseload with a good level of independence.
- You communicate clearly, build rapport with consumers and families, and work in a way that is respectful, culturally responsive and aligned with the Mental Health and Wellbeing Act 2022.
- You are comfortable working in a service that supports consumers with higher intensity needs and you can adapt your approach as circumstances change.
- You value reflective practice, seek feedback and contribute positively to team culture.

Your Experience

- Minimum 2 years' experience providing clinical mental health services, ideally within community or high-demand environments.
- Strong understanding of recovery frameworks and evidence-based interventions for consumers with complex mental health needs.
- Working knowledge of the Mental Health and Wellbeing Act 2022 and its application in clinical practice.
- Experience engaging with consumers and families from diverse backgrounds and supporting meaningful participation in care.
- Demonstrated ability to work collaboratively within a multidisciplinary team and contribute to coordinated care planning.
- Well-developed documentation and communication skills, including the ability to clearly record assessments, interventions and clinical decisions.

- High level of reliability, professional conduct, and ability to work autonomously while contributing to team-based care.
- Experience working collaboratively with primary health providers and relevant community services to support coordinated care.
- Well-developed interpersonal and communication skills, with the ability to problem-solve, negotiate and build effective working relationships with consumers, carers and service providers.
- Ability to work with consumers from diverse cultural backgrounds within a recovery-oriented, inclusive, gender-sensitive and family-focused framework.
- Current Victorian Driver Licence and capacity to drive fleet vehicles.
- Compliance with all legal requirements related to maintaining current professional registration.
